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The Penguin Club Celebrates 35 Years

It all started in 1990, when a group of Oamaru musicians identified a need for a space to call their own - a space where they could practice, chill out after gigs, have a few drinks and not bother anyone with the noise.

A gig at the Five Forks Hall was put on as a fundraiser, and about \$150 was raised to get the ball rolling. On November 27, 1990, an open meeting was held and a week later the Penguin Entertainers Club was formed. The annex of the Andersons grain store in Emulsion Lane was transformed using borrowed and second-hand materials, straightened nails and diluted green paint and lots of enthusiasm! A stage & toilets were built and the music began. Initially, patrons brought their own drinks, but as the club grew and more money was raised, a basic bar was constructed using timber left over from an old movie set. Food was provided outside by a mobile food cart. Local bands practiced and jammed on a Friday night then the word got around the touring bands and promoters that there was this little venue with an appreciative audience and great acoustics between the main centres of Christchurch and Dunedin. Soon there were a wide range of gigs, and over the years had gone from one end of the spectrum to the other, from string quartets to full-on punk, to comedians, to burlesque shows! As soon as you enter the Penguin Entertainers Club, you are confronted with its rich history. The walls are plastered with 35 years of posters of past gigs featuring acts such Supergroove, the Exponents, Anika Moa, Elemnop, the D4, Steriogram, Tami Neilson, Nathan Haines, the Feelers, Shona Laing, Sam Hunt and many international acts. The Club, run by volunteers, continues its support of local bands with jam nights every second Friday of the month and still has guest bands visiting. The Penguin Entertainers Club celebrated its 35th anniversary on Saturday 22nd November and is the Oamaru Whitestone Civic Trust's longest tenant.




McCarthy's Coal Building.

Criterion Hotel Restoration

For those of you who have visited recently, you will have seen scaffolding around the Criterion Hotel in Oamaru's Harbour and Tyne St Heritage Precinct. The Oamaru Whitestone Civic Trust's refurbishment of this landmark building—long the focal point of the original business area—is now well underway.

De Geest Construction were selected as the main contractor to complete the structural strengthening and interior work. A structural-strengthening diaphragm has been installed on the ground floor, and the original tongue-and-groove ceilings have been reinstated. The main interior works are scheduled for completion by early May, including the installation of a sprinkler system that will provide fire protection to the Criterion and four adjoining buildings.

New toilets and a kitchen have been constructed downstairs, with new tongue-and-groove flooring laid in the lounge, dining room, and hallway. Colin Dewe, the new lessee, has begun the interior decoration and the final fit-out prior to opening.

Dooleys Masonry is the contractor for the exterior refurbishment, which includes the replacement of the parapet. The decorative balustrades and urns will be reinstated, returning the building to its original glory. Their absence in recent years has left the Criterion looking, as some have said, "like a queen without her crown."

This \$600,000 project has been made possible through major grants from Lottery Environment and Heritage, Community Trust Otago, the Waitaki District Council, and the Alexander McMillan Trust. Once reopened, the Criterion will add to the expanding list of refurbished heritage buildings that continue to attract a growing number of visitors to this unique area.
